Preview of the Documentary: "Concert at Geneva Cathedral"

2. Petros Shoujounian – Sinfonietta for Strings No. 1

Petros Shoujounian's *Sinfonietta for Strings No. 1* is a profoundly spiritual work inspired by Armenian liturgical melodies. The piece consists of three movements:

- **Moderato 'ISK I HÉGHMANÉ'**: Inspired by a 12th-century hymn by Nerses Shnorhali dedicated to Armenian martyrs, this movement conveys solemnity and sacrifice.
- Adagio 'I GÉRÉZMAN HARUTZÉLAYUN': Rooted in medieval Armenian liturgical music, this meditative movement reflects on Christ's resurrection, creating a contemplative and reverent atmosphere.
- Allegro 'GOHAR VARDN': Based on a 10th-century hymn by Grigor Narekatsi, this vibrant movement celebrates Christ's Transfiguration, filled with divine joy and festive energy.

Shoujounian weaves these ancient melodies with contemporary touches, creating a bridge between the sacred and the modern.

3. Georg Friedrich Händel – "Messiah" (Excerpts)

Händel's famous *Messiah* will conclude the program, transporting the audience into the grandeur of the Baroque era. The selected excerpts highlight the emotional power of this oratorio, including the triumphant "*Hallelujah*" and the delicate "For Unto Us a Child is Born." Händel's profound religious themes resonate deeply alongside the spiritual works of Komitas and Shoujounian, offering an evening of sacred reflection and exultation.

Performers and Ensemble

- Luc Baghdassarian, renowned conductor and pianist, will lead the orchestra and choir. With an illustrious career across Europe and beyond, his interpretation adds invaluable depth to this eclectic program.
- **Symphonic Choir of Vevey (CSV)**: Established in 1859, this choir is a cornerstone of Swiss musical culture. Under Luc Baghdassarian's direction, they will perform the choral sections, blending Händel's grandeur with the delicate spirituality of Komitas and Shoujounian.
- Orchestra of Symphonic Variations (OSV): Founded in 2014, the OSV comprises professional musicians from the Lake Geneva region. Having performed in prestigious venues like Montreux's Stravinski Hall and Geneva's Victoria Hall, they are the ideal ensemble to bring these works to life.

About the Composers

- **Komitas Vartabed**: A monumental figure in preserving and revitalizing Armenian folk music, his works, such as the *Miniatures*, reflect a deep connection to Armenia's spiritual and cultural traditions.
- **Petros Shoujounian**: An Armenian composer, conductor, and violinist of international acclaim, Shoujounian's works blend Armenian liturgical traditions with contemporary orchestral techniques, creating a profound dialogue between the past and present.
- **Georg Friedrich Händel**: A master of the Baroque era, Händel's *Messiah* is among the most performed works in the Western classical repertoire, offering a universal spiritual experience.
